2:45 Best Practices and Pitfalls All Energy Companies Should Know When Litigating Theft of Trade Secret Cases (.5 hr)

The filing of trade secret misappropriation cases is climbing in both federal and state court. With the protections available under the DTSA and TUTSA, energy companies are actively litigating under these statutes to safeguard their trade secrets and police unfair competition. Critical to the outcome of these cases is the measures taken to secure the confidentiality of trade secrets in advance of litigation. With the energy industry being heavily driven by data, new technology, global communications, and the movement of key talent, the hiring and departure of employees represent key gateways for incorporating trade secret protections. Active consulting, service and transactional trends in the industry likewise enhance the need for utilizing measures to protect the ownership and existence of trade secrets in advance of negotiations or due diligence. Trade secret misappropriation cases have been won and lost based on the business measures in place or lack thereof – highlighting the critical importance of implementing best practices to safeguard trade secrets and being aware of pitfalls that can lead to the loss of trade secret status.

3:30 Collecting Judgments in Energy Litigation (.75 hr)

Once you have invested the resources in winning a money judgment against your opponent or counterparty, you have a strong incentive to actually turn that into a monetary recovery, if possible. Unfortunately, trial-level litigators who might secure the judgment in the first place may not have the enthusiasm or expertise for post-judgment collection. D. Brent Wells has collected judgments for major energy exploration and production companies, traders that buy and sell energy products such as natural gas, and oilfield service companies that deliver labor and materials on credit. In this presentation Brent will rundown legal options, remedies, and strategies for collecting your energy-related judgment, including asset discovery, judgment liens, execution, garnishment, and turnover.
